





This survey was carried out on 65 year 7/8 students, aged 11-13, including the target group involved in the Erasmus project.

The main findings are:

· Students have experienced more bullying online than face to face

- Students can name very few forms of online bullying and the most a person could name was 2
- Students generally do not know how to report online bullying or where to gethelp
- School should talk more about bullying prevention and, in particular, talk more about cyberbullying, how to stay safe online, and how to protect online accounts





This survey was carried out with the same cohort of students as the initial survey. The results are overwhelmingly positive in regards to the Erasmus project having impact on both the student's education of cyberbullying and also how to stay safe, and report any incidents if necessary.

The work with parents may need further promotion, to ensure all parents are confident in ensuring their child's social media accounts are safe.




The survey on Cyberbullying classes IV – V



The survey on Cyberbullying was conducted among students of classes IV – V in May 2022.



63 people took part in the vote survey



Analysis of surveys

conducted among students of grades 6-8 as part of the Erasmus+ Project implemented at school:

June 2023

Pollsters collected over 100 surveys among students of our school. In parallel with the surveys, interviews were conducted with students from grades 3-5 who expressed their opinions on issues related to the Internet and cyberbullying. Both the Interviews and the Surveys were anonymous.



Survey results and statistics Surveys for grade 6:


29 works were analyzed.



As you can see in the attached graphics, a large proportion of young people from 29 works do not have parental control. However, 79.3% of them are controlled by their parents online. This is quite a good result compared to the further results of the Surveys. Despite a fairly large percentage of people who are controlled by their parents about what they do online, there are still some people who are not. This may or may not lead to underage use of 18+ sites and other inappropriate things later on. Young people not controlled by their parents can become addicted to the Internet, and at the same time can lead to unpleasant health effects. We can also observe and support this phenomenon during the analysis of the Chart regarding Questions 2, Questions 5 and 4. Then we can notice and conclude that spending time on the Internet and lack of parental control coincide, which also confirms the previous thesis.

Grade 7 Polls


There were 20 works that qualified.



We note that, as in the case of Grade 6 Charts, young people use an increasing variety of social media, and at the same time the time spent on the Internet has stabilized at 4-5 hours and 2-3 hours.

Grade 8 Polls

There were 53 works that qualified.






We see the opposite situation than in older classes. Parents monitor their children on the Internet, checking their browsing history, asking what they are doing, who they are writing to, etc. We can also observe a positive phenomenon in Poland. Children know what cyberbullying, the Internet and social media are. And almost all younger Poles of this age already use social media, which may be both a good and a bad effect of the increasingly developing Polish Internet space.

Analysis of interviews of students from grades 3-5,

56 students participated in the study.

□ 99% of students know what cyberbullying is

☐ 75% of students stated that they had been victims of cyberbullying

69% of students said that someone used their photo on the Internet without their consent

64% of students experienced aggressive behavior from peers on the Internet

□ 56% of students said that their parents/guardians control what their children do online

□ 63% of students have ever witnessed cyberbullying

85% of students have ever made fun of someone online

□ 54% of students reacted in some way when they knew someone was suffering online

☐ 73% of students believe that cyberbullying is not a big problem at their school

☐ When asked how they helped the injured person, the students answered as follows:

I informed my harassed friend who she could turn to for help

- □ I defended this person
- □ I took care of this person so that he would not be sad

I provided this person with legal assistance and moral support

- □ I informed an adult
- 🗆 I helped
- □ I informed him where he could apply
- □ I told her parents about it
- □ I didn't help
- I informed an adult
- □ I stood up for her
- □ I informed her to contact a trusted person
- □ I informed her to report to the teacher

Conclusions :

- Students know what cyberbullying is
- Still the majority of students over 60% experience various forms of cyberbullying
- Almost half of students' parents/guardians control what their children do on the Internet
- More than half of the surveyed students reacted when someone was harassed
- The majority of students over 70% believe that cyberbullying is not a big problem at their school

We believe that the results obtained from our research, surveys and observations are overwhelmingly positive in terms of the impact of the Erasmus project on educating students about cyberbullying, as well as how to stay safe and, if necessary, where to report any incidents. Continued work with both students and parents is necessary. Parents should try to have more control over what their children do when using the Internet and keep them safe.


Initial analysis of cyberbullying

In our school 215 students from 5th grade to 8th grade, ages 11-15 were asked about cyberbullying victimization in October 2020.

The report revealed that 22% of students were bullied.

Cyberbullying included:

- \Box sending hateful messages
- \Box excluded/uninvited from groups
- □ directly sending insults



Final cyberbullying analysis

In our school 235 students from 5 th grade to 8 th grade, ages 11-15 were asked

about cyberbullying victimization in May 2023.

The report revealed that <u>9% of students were victims</u> of various forms of cyberbuling including sending hateful messages, excluded/uninvited from groups, directly sending insults, <u>9% of students experienced negative emotions</u>. The raport also revealed that 82% of students know what to do in case of an aggression in the online environment.
